## **INTRODUCTION:**

My name is Roxanne Delgado and I reside in the Bronx. I am an activist for both human and animal rights and I work at a homeless shelter. Last year I testified at the Quadrennial Advisory Commission and the City Council hearings against the pay raises for the city elected officials. Last month I ran for Female District Leader in my Assembly District.

## **CITY COUNCIL SALARY SHOULD NOT BE CONSIDERED**

What the city council did is an example of what should not be done. The commission recommended for city council a pay raise up to 138,315 from \$112,500 “conditioned upon and inseparable from eliminating lulus and classifying the job of city council members as full time”

Instead in 2016 the city council gave themselves \$10,000 more than the commission recommended and raise their salary retroactively to \$148,500 from a base of \$112,500 and passed those reforms prospectively for the new class of members in 2018. In 2006 the city council gave themselves a 25% raise (\$112,550 from \$90,000) without passing any of the recommended reforms and keeping the lulus.

The city council salary should not be considered because it is based on greed and self-dealing at the high cost of our democracy and trust in Government.

### **STIPENDS (Exhibit 1 &2) SHOULD BE CONSIDERED**

As you can see in Exhibit 1, 70% of the Assembly receive lulus and over 50% of them make over \$90,000. In the Senate, (Exhibit 2) over 90 % received lulus and 80% make over \$90,000. These numbers are from the Year 2015.

Therefore, with stipends included the majority of the elected make over \$90,0000.

### **THEIR SALARIES VERSES OUR SALARIES**

As you can see in Exhibit 3, in 2000, the elected (Assembly/Senate) were in the top 10 highest paid in New York State. In 2015, they are in the top 30 highest paid. In the Bronx county they were the second highest paid in 2000 and are in the top 8 in 2015 (Exhibit 3B). Please note their rank moves up if lulus are included which they should be.

In Exhibit 4, our elected officials make more than the median household income of 59 of the 62 counties in New York State. Please look at the Bronx whose median income is less than \$33,000.

The inequality between our income and our elected officials is a strong indication of the self-dealing and mismanagement of our Government. Besides the inequality, the question is do they merit a raise and the answer is NO.

## **PEFORMANCES/RESULTS SHOULD BE CONSIDERED – DO THEY MERIT A RAISE – NO**

\*The Center for Public Integrity has rank NYS as the No 1 in corruption.

\*Five straight Senate leaders (Dean Skelos, Malcom Smith, John Sampson, Pedro Espada Jr, Joseph Bruno) charged with using the office illegally for personal gain and leaders of both chambers were sentenced to jail

\*No ethic reforms passed including closing the LLC loophole and eliminating outside income

\*Lack of transparency, many bills introduced but less than 5 percent pass and many get decided at midnight on the last day of session. (I and the public have no input since the lobbyists run the show)

\*Bronx has the 2<sup>nd</sup> lowest voter turnout in the nation

## **CONSTITUENTS SERVICES**

First our elected officials should focus on bigger issues such as passing bills and solving problems – homelessness, failing schools, rising rents, unemployment, etc.

For elected to deal with broken street lights, pot holes, street naming, fix construction errors, etc is inefficient and duplication of services.

We have 311, the public advocate, the borough presidents, the community boards, the district managers, city council members, the mayor community affairs unit, and the community affairs for each city agency dealing with the residents' requests for city services and quality of life complaints. In fact, there are too many people involved and it actually takes longer to get any issue resolved in a timely manner.

Our elected officials should FOCUS on the BIG and Important issues and pass bills. Perhaps even focus on why city and state agencies are not doing their jobs and hold someone accountable.

## **FULL TIME VERSES PART TIME**

Currently AND statutory it is a part time job because I do not count the time they campaign for themselves or for others. Nor do I count their time attending fundraisers and parties. The job is to serve the public and neither of the above mentioned does that.

Susan Lerner of Common Cause made the same argument that the reason why most of the city council members didn't have any outside income was because they work full time. That is not true. They didn't have outside income because most of

them made over 125k with the lulus and didn't need a second job as most as us do in the Bronx. In fact, I am starting a second job next week.

### **TOP/MIDDLE MANAGER SALARIES IS AN APPLE/ORANGE COMPARSION**

Look at the jobs requirements of those top and middle managers. They need higher education such as MBAs and 7 to 10 years of experience with a track record. The only requirement to hold office is residency and age. Most of our elected don't hold an accounting or finance degree nor have any budgeting skills. They have staff that do that kind of work for them.

### **RAISES TO RECRUITED TALENTED AND COMMITTED PEOPLE TO RUN**

As I stated I ran for female district leader which is an unpaid party position. Yet for an unpaid party positon, not only did the Bronx Democratic Committee Party send out mailings and literature but they ALL endorsed against me. (Exhibit 5).

The Bronx Democratic party not only protects it incumbents but also picks who will fill a vacated seat. I think the Democratic party role should support the democratic winner in the general election instead of dominating the democratic primaries. This is why many people tell me that they don't vote because the winner has already been chosen. Those who are qualified and/or bright won't win unless they have lots of money or they

are friends of the Democratic machine. Therefore, it is the machine not the people that elects them and it is the party not the people that is served. In the Bronx 100% of the incumbents won this recent primary. (see Exhibit 6)

Another example of how competition is eliminated and/or destroyed is during the “clubbing of the seal” season as it is referred when the Bronx Democratic Party knocks off opponents off the ballots. Since Party bosses and district leaders appoint election workers and some even work in the BOE, there is an unequal playing field and it is harder for the opponent to get on the ballots.

A strong example of how competition is eliminated and power is closely held is elected officials also hold nonpaid party positions. I read Assembly member (42<sup>nd</sup> AD) Rodneyse Bichotte letter dated Sept20th seeking a raise over 70% and she mentions women and people of color.

Assembly Member Bichotte ran for female state committee woman this primary and is the unopposed female district leader as well. (please see Exhibit 7). Why she is holding 2 nonpaid party position? She is asking for more money for her paid position yet she hold 2 non paid positions as female committee member and female district.

The reason is to eliminate competition and she is stopping other women and people of color from entering the political arena by hoarding all the positions in her 42<sup>nd</sup> assembly district.

As you can see in Exhibit 6 pertaining to the Bronx only, there are several elected that hold non paid party positions or one of their relatives holds it.

There are other ways the Machine stops people from entering the political arena but the above 3 examples are the most obvious and strongest to point out. Therefore, more money will only make the party machine stronger and democracy weaker.

## **SPECIAL ELECTIONS**

Not only do special elections have extremely low turnouts but they also cost the taxpayers millions of dollars. Special elections were meant for unfortunate events such as death, sickness and/or resignation.

However now the elected run for reelection knowing that they will not serve their full time but run for another office the following year and they are paid while campaigning. Unlike me who took a week off with no paid during GOTV week for my race.

For example, the deal referred to “the Bronx Dirty Deal” where the Bronx Democratic Party handpicked our new Bronx District Attorney. In response to criticism, Former Bronx District Attorney Johnson responded “Do what’s best for you, and don’t resign a job without a job. (Exhibit 8)

Well it is for a fact that many city council members will be term out next year and it is hardly a secret nor a surprise that many will play musical chairs with their respective assembly member or senator. Just as the Weprin Brothers exchanged seats from city council to assembly and vice versa. Just as Eric Dilan and his former chief of staff Rafael Espinal exchanged seats from city council to assembly and vice versa. And they did this with the help of their Queens and Brooklyn Party bosses. Just as current city council member Inez Dickens has won unopposed Keith Wright's assembly seat and he will most likely win her city council seat.

Where is the competition where the best and brightest and hopefully an honest one can serve the people? Throwing more money at the politicians will not help but hinder Democracy more since they will ever be more protective of their jobs with such a salary.

### **Cost of Living adjustment.**

The Cost of living adjustment from 2000 to present date is 38.1% for those on Social Security. I don't understand why this commission is even considering anything about that rate. The proposed salary of \$148,000 is over 85%. That is ABSURB. Please see exhibit 9 where the salary present day with the social security cost of living adjustment is \$109,781. This amount should be the ceiling and no other amount higher than this should even be considered.



## **CLOSING**

The fact that they are crying poverty while they are in the top 30 highest paid wages and they make more money than the than the median household income of 59 of the 62 counties in New York State is unbelievable. The fact that some state they will be honest if they make more money is offensive. Many of us live in poverty yet we are not stealing. And lastly if they don't like their salary then why did they rerun for the same office if they are unsatisfied with the pay? They can seek other employment if their want more money. Goldman Sachs can pay them more. Taking more from the public who mostly make less then they do is unjust.

Also they compare the salaries of elected official in other states but as I stated in Quadrennial Commission, their salaries were higher because they work full time and they have no pensions unlike the New York State Elected Officials.

I HIGHLY recommend NO RAISES for them this year due to the above reasons. However I sincerely believe they will receive their 76 to 86 percent just as the city council did at the cost of the public trust in government and democracy.

# The corrupt gift that keeps on giving for political hacks

First, the Bronx Democratic machine engineered District Attorney Robert Johnson into a comfy judgeship — while avoiding any whiff of democracy in replacing him. Now comes word of his nice pay boost.

Johnson admitted to The Post that, on top of his \$174,000 judicial salary, he'll also collect 142-grand a year as a retired DA. The combo could hit \$316,000 — a hefty hike from the \$190,000 he pulls now.

Nice reward for a guy who's been DA for more than a quarter-century, amassing the lowest prosecution *and* worst conviction rates in the city, among other fiascos.

At the other end of the game is Judge-About-To-Be-DA Darcel Clark, now blissfully claiming she had *no* idea how she got handed the new job, and she's nobody's puppet. Right.

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### Cost-Of-Living Adjustments

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Automatic Determinations COLA determination SSI payment rates increase with COLA

Since 1975, Social Security general benefit increases have been cost-of-living adjustments or COLAs. The 1975-82 COLAs were effective with Social Security benefits payable for June in each of those years; thereafter COLAs have been effective with benefits payable for December.

Prior to 1975, Social Security benefit increases were set by legislation.

The first COLA, for June 1975, was based on the increase in the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) from the second quarter of 1974 to the first quarter of 1975. The 1976-83 COLAs were based on increases in the CPI-W from the first quarter of the prior year to the corresponding quarter of the current year in which the COLA became effective. After 1983, COLAs have been based on increases in the CPI-W from the third quarter of the prior year to the corresponding quarter of the current year in which the COLA became effective.

### **SSI COLAs**

COLAs for the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program are generally the same as those for the Social Security program. However, COLAs for SSI have generally been effective for the month following the effective month of Social Security benefit increases. See SSI historical payment standards for more detail.
