2	and in preparing my remarks, I came across a
3	wonderful statement about Judge Jasen in the Law
4	Review that said of him that he has long
5	occupied the seat of good sense on the

7	reason and ordinary common sense, Judge Jasen
8	reassures the rest of us that law in this state
9	is still in a healthy relationship to life.
10	And I'm sure, Judge, that when your career on
11	the Court of Appeals comes to an end, the same
12	will be said of you.

14	CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: I had a question.
15	What was the joke he told you?
16	MR. MCCARTHY: His wife and daughter are
17	here.
. 18	CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: The last speaker is
19	Elena Ruth Sassower, who will speak on the
20	qualifications of Judge Pigott.
21	MS. SASSOWER: Not a lot of room for evidence
22	on this table. Would members of the committee
23	care for a copy of my statement?
24	CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: Maybe after you make

1	it, so we can keep moving.
2	MS. SASSOWER: As you wish.
3	CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: Thank you.
4	MS. SASSOWER: Good afternoon. My name is
5	Elena Ruth Sassower and I am director and
6	co-founder of the Center for Judicial
7	Accountability, Inc., (CJA), a non-partisan,
8	non-profit citizens' organization dedicated to
9	safeguarding the public interest in judicial
10	selection and discipline.
11	CJA opposes Senate confirmation of Governor
12	Pataki's appointment of Eugene F. Pigott, Jr. to
13	the New York Court of Appeals. We view it as the
14	Governor's latest manipulation of the judicial
15	appointments process, which we have documented
16	time, after time, after time involving
17	appointments at all levels of the judiciary. CJA's
18	website, www.judgewatch.org, posts the
19	substantiating documentary proof, accessible via
20	the sidebar panel "Judicial Selection-State/NY".
21	This committee did not require Justice Pigott
22	to complete a publicly available questionnaire
23	setting forth the specifics of his background,
24	his political activity, his legal, judicial and

other positions he has held, his most significant decisions, his published writings and speeches, or any other information as to what he views as his qualifications. Nor, apparently, has the Committee asked Justice Pigott to furnish other documents bearing on his qualifications and fitness to be publicly available. Consequently, the public and the press, acting on its behalf, are unable to investigate what Justice Pigott purports to be his relevant background and credentials.

From our Googling Justice Pigott's name on the internet, we found the New York Court system's online posting of his bio, the last sentence of which caught our interest, "He served as a member of the Governor's Temporary Judicial Screening Committee between 1995 and 1996."

The Temporary Judicial Screening Committee, established on April 25, 1995, by Governor Pataki's Executive Order No. 11, was supposed to be just that, temporary. It was to exist until the permanent Judicial Screening Committees, established by Governor Pataki's simultaneously promulgated Executive Order No. 10, were "fully

1	operational". "
2	CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: Excuse me,
3	Ms. Sassower. You're talking about the process
4	now. The purpose of this hearing is to make the
5	determination upon the qualifications of this
6	individual to serve on the Court of Appeals. Do
7	you have any comment concerning that?
8	MS. SASSOWER: Absolutely.
9	CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: Would you get to
10	those, please.
11	MS. SASSOWER: I am presenting as to Justice
12	Pigott's participation on the Temporary Judicial
13	Screening Committee.
14	CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: I think you were
15	getting into your objections of the screening
16	committee process, not his appearance on it.
17	MS. SASSOWER: Is it your view, stated before
18	all, that you care not one wit of the process
19	that has produced him?
20	CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: Ms. Sassower, we've
21	gone through this, and I'm giving you one more
22	opportunity to speak. This time it's the same
23	rules as last time, and that is about the
24	qualifications of this individual.

1	MS. SASSOWER: Exactly.
2	CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: What observations do
3	you have as to the qualifications of this
4	individual?
5	MS. SASSOWER: Let me present.
6	Yet it took nearly two years before members
7	of the permanent committees were even appointed,
8	and then
9	CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: Excuse me,
10	Ms. Sassower. Again, I want to be pleasant, but
11	on the other hand, you are talking about the
12	process you're objecting to and the appointment
13	of members to a certain committee. That's not
14	what we're here for, and we're going to be very
15	close to
16	MS. SASSOWER: I am presenting as to Justice
17	Pigott's participation in a hoax called the
18	Temporary Judicial Screening Committee.
19	CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: Ms. Sassower
20	MS. SASSOWER: And I am getting to the
21	details of that. Please let me present it in
22	some sequential fashion so they're
23	understandable.
24	CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: Ms. Sassower, for the

1	last time, this is your last opportunity. There
2	is an individual here that's been nominated for a
3	specific position, and the question on this
4	group's mind right now is whether he's qualified.
5	MS. SASSOWER: He is not.
6	CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: Well, tell me why and
7	don't tell me about process, but tell me about
8	this individual, otherwise your testimony is
9	over.
10	MS. SASSOWER: We do not know what month in
11	1996 Justice Piggott stepped down as a member of
12	the Temporary Judicial Screening Committee, but
13	our interaction with Mr. Finnegan, the Governor's
14	counsel, was in the spring of 1996.
15	CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: Is there a motion to
16	terminate the testimony of this witness as being
17	non-germane to this hearing?
18	MS. SASSOWER: Perhaps they would like to
19	view my statement so they'll understand my
20	CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: So moved by Senator
21	Skelos, seconded by Senator Balboni. All in
22	favor? Opposed?
23	(Whereupon a vote is taken and the motion is
24	passed)

1	SENATOR VOLKER: Give us your statement, if
2	you have a copy.
3	CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: You can give your
4	statement
5	MS. SASSOWER: Your running from this is a
6	reflection on the Committee, because there
7	is no scrutiny of your
8	CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: Ms. Sassower
9	MS. SASSOWER: And your conduct of this
10	committee
11	CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: Ms. Sassower
12	MS. SASSOWER: standards which refer to
13	this as a
14	CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: You are embarrassing
15	yourself.
16	MS. SASSOWER: Why don't you ask him about
17	the Temporary Judicial Screening Committee?
18	CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: Judge Pigott, would
19 .	you please come up as the members are going to
20	ask questions
21	MS. SASSOWER: Well, you received the file on
22	the New York State Judicial Conduct which was
23	presented to the Temporary Judicial Screening
24	Committee

i	CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: We're all set. We're
2	going to start asking questions. Will you go
3	back to your seat, please, and give a copy of
4	your statement to Senator Saland.
5	MS. SASSOWER: This is supposed to be a
6	selection process.
7	CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: That's correct.
8	MS. SASSOWER: There hasn't been any
9	compliance with merit
10	CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: You've been excused.
11	MS. SASSOWER: all the evidence to the
12	contrary, including
13	CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: Is there a way to turn
14	this mike off?
15	SENATOR SKELOS: Mr. Chairman, may we proceed
16	with the questions?
17	CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: We are.
18	Are there any questions of Judge Pigott from
19	the members of the committee?
20	Senator Skelos.
21	SENATOR SKELOS: There's a number of
22	individuals who have mentioned separation of
23	power. You've been on the judicial committee and
24	heard a number of people indicate that. How do

you draw the line? How do you make the determination? How do you make a determination as to when you're encroaching upon what is really a legislative process?

JUSTICE PIGOTT: My general philosophy with respect to that, it's an old saying among some judges, is, read the statute, read the statute, read the statute. And I've found in my experience, particularly as an appellate judge where you have, in my case, four other jurists working on a case with you, quite often the litigant overlooks that and you find yourself in a case where there's been a jump to a conclusion or proposition that doesn't have a sound basis. So I approach each case, I like to say, with a great deal of humility, because I don't think I'm much smarter than, for example, this body or the governor or another court, frankly, and I therefore like to start at the very basic statute that is being interpreted and work from there and see where the case goes, and that has led me, as Judge Pine pointed out so well, I had forgotten one or two of those cases, and not wander away from it. Because what is your providence as
