12	The next and final speaker is Elena
13	Sassower, director of the Center for Judicial
14	Accountability.
15	MS. SASSOWER: Give me just a moment to
16	set up, please.
17	CHAIRMAN DeFRANCISCO: Sure.
18	All set?
19	MS. SASSOWER: Thank you.
20	CHAIRMAN DeFRANCISCO: Okay, go ahead.
21	MS. SASSOWER: My name is Elena
22	Sassower. I'm director of the Center for
23	Judicial Accountability, a nonpartisan,
24	nonprofit citizens organization that documents

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1	corruption in the judiciary involving judicial
2	selection, judicial discipline, the judicial
3	process itself.
4	I have good news. For the past seven
5	hours you've heard testimony about the dire
6	straits that so many agencies are confronting
7	because they have lost funding and they don't
8	have the resources for the essential services
9	they provide. I have good news. You have money
10	to provide to them, and that is the money that
11	is presently earmarked for the judicial pay
12	raises.
13	You have before you distributed the
14	executive summary to the opposition report of
15	our nonprofit, nonpartisan citizens organization
16	to the August 29, 2011, "Final Report of the
17	Special Commission on Judicial Compensation.
18	That was the commission that recommended
19	judicial pay raises of 37 percent over three
20	years. (Els mistak. + shald have seen 272)
21	The first phase of those pay raises
22	st became effective April 1, 2012. The second
23	phase is now scheduled to take effect April 1,
24	2013. Those pay raises must be voided,

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overridden by you, because they are unconstitutional, statutorily violative, and fraudulent.

The demonstration of that was contained in our opposition report, and I'd like to hand it up, please.

CHAIRMAN DeFRANCISCO: We have got an executive summary of your opposition report. You want us to have the whole report?

MS. SASSOWER: Yes. Infact, 1 have -CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: Okay. Well, Dottie, would you hand it up to us? And we'll make it part of the record. Okay.

MS. SASSOWER: Now, this opposition report was delivered on October 27, 2011, to our highest constitutional officers in our three government branches -- to the Governor, to the Chief Judge, to the Assembly Speaker and Temporary Senate President -- specifically and explicitly so that they could take steps to protect the public. The first of those steps being to override the judicial pay raises recommended by the Commission on Judicial Compensation, based on our showing.

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1	There has been no production by these
2	public officers of their findings of fact and
3	conclusions of law with respect to our
4	opposition report. I have had correspondence
5	with you asking for you to secure from them
6	their findings of fact and conclusions of law.
7	Likewise, to secure from the Attorney General
8	his findings of fact and conclusions of law.
9	I have received no response from you.
10	No one has denied or disputed the accuracy of
11	the presentation here. And it is your
12	obligation to make such findings of fact and
13	conclusions of law based upon this
14	presentation.
15	Now, in advance of today's testimony I
16	examined the Judiciary Budget and I was unable
17	to find the amount, the dollar amount of the
18	judicial pay raises scheduled to take effect
19	automatically this April 1, 2013, unless
20	overridden by the Legislature.
21	May I ask you, what is that dollar
22	amount?
23	CHAIRMAN DeFRANCISCO: This hearing is
24	for people to make comments to the Legislature.

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1	It's not a question-and-answer period.
2	MS. SASSOWER: Well, I was unable to
3	identify anywhere in the budget the dollar
4	figure of those judicial pay raises.
5	Now, last year that dollar figure was
6	identified in the executive summary of the
7	Judiciary's budget as \$27.7 million. This year
8	there was no identification of the figure in the
9	executive summary or elsewhere in the budget.
10	Likewise, I was unable to find any
11	dollar figure of the compensation and
12	nonsalaried benefits, excluding salary, paid to
13	judges and justices of the unified court
14	system. Demand was made in correspondence, in a
15	letter from me to the Judiciary for that
16	information. I said, "I do not see it
17	anywhere. Where is it?" They refused to
18	provide that information.
19	The public is entitled to know how much
20	this second phase of judicial pay raises is
21	costing.
22	Now, the Finance Committees have in
23	prior years objected to the lack of itemization
24	in the Judiciary's budget. This year, in this

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1	he	earing, there was no there was no comment
2	ab	oout the insufficiency of the budget, the lack
3	of	itemization. The fact that they have not
4	ic	dentified the cost of the judicial pay raises,

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
1determines that a budget is not sufficiently2itemized, then it should decline to adopt it.3However, once adopted, the logical inference can4be drawn, that the Legislature found the budget5to be sufficiently itemized and capable of6implementation."7I respectfully submit that the reason8why there was so little number-crunching at this9committee hearing is because the members of this10committee really don't understand the budget.11It escapes them. And I think it's time to 'fess12up to that reality.13I will additionally point out that there14is another issue that needed to be brought to15your attention. Last year, in questioning by16Senator Saland of the acting director of the17Criminal Justice Services, it was identified18that because of the judicial pay raises,19salaries of the district attorneys were20necessarily increased. 8	In our opposition report, we pointed out
9	that one of the deficiencies of the report of
10	the Commission on Judicial Compensation is that
11	it did not identify that there was a statutory

14	the state. That is now coming back to haunt
15	you. And I would respectfully draw to your
16	attention to the colloquy last year between Sean
17	Byrne, the then-acting director of the Criminal
18	Justice Services, and then-Senator Saland as to
19	who was going to be footing the bill. And
20	apparently the full bill is coming due to the
21	state, not the counties. And this is on top of
22	the salary increases, last year \$27.7 million,
23	this year
24	CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: Excuse me,

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Ms. Sassower. Excuse me, Ms. Sassower. We've given everybody the same allotted time, and your time is up. So please wrap up.

MS. SASSOWER: Thank you. Thank you very much. I would like to hand up, in addition to the opposition report, the lawsuit against the three government branches for collusion against the people on the judicial compensation issue. Those judicial pay raises are fraudulent, statutorily violative, unconstitutional. And they are the subject of a serious and substantial legal challenge.

I provide you the -- the most important exhibit, needless to say, to the lawsuit brought in the public interest on behalf of the people of the State of New York is the October 27, 2011, opposition report to the Committee on Judicial Compensation's report. That's the most important exhibit to the verified complaint, whose balance I have now handed up.

I would additionally provide you hard copies because --

CHAIRMAN DeFRANCISCO: Okay, time out. MS. SASSOWER: This is a lot of money of

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the taxpayers, \$27.7 million last year --

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Jonkyn Jonkyn Hank ? Hank ? CHAIRMAN DEFRANCISCO: I understand. Okay, if you want to hand anything else up, just bring it me or give it to Dottie. We do have to conclude the hearing. We have to treat everybody the same time frame.

So thank you very much for testifying, and we'll take that.

The meeting is now closed, the hearing is now closed. We'll start up again on Monday. Thank you.
