CHAPTER 986

AN ACT to amend the judiciary law and the legislative law, in relation to the compensation and allowances payable to judges and justices of the unified court system and of members of the legislature; and to amend the New York city civil court act, in relation to the compensation of housing judges; the county law, in relation to the payment of state aid to certain counties relative to the payment of compensation to district attorneys of certain counties; the executive law and the state finance law, in relation to the compensation and allowances payable to certain state officers

Became a law December 7, 1984, with the approval of the Governor. Passed on message of necessity pursuant to Article III, section 14 of the Constitution by a majority vote, three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section two hundred twenty-one of the judiciary law is repealed and a new section two hundred twenty-one is added to read as follows:

§ 221. *Salary of judges of the court of appeals. The annual salaries of the chief judge and associate judges of the court of appeals shall be as follows:*

§ 11. Section two hundred twenty-two of such law is repealed and a new section two hundred twenty-two is added to read as follows:

§ 222. *Expenses of judges and justices.* Notwithstanding any other provision of law, and subject to such rules and regulations as the chief administrator shall prescribe:

(a) each judge of the court of appeals, each justice of the supreme court, including the justices of the appellate divisions thereof, and each judge of the court of claims shall be reimbursed for his actual and necessary transportation expenses, and such other travel expenses not to exceed seventy-five dollars per day as he shall actually and necessarily incur in the performance of his judicial duties outside the county wherein he is provided chambers and other than in a county having a population in excess of seven hundred thousand or in a city having a population in excess of one million, and not to exceed one hundred dollars per day in a county having a population in excess of seven hundred thousand or in a city having a population in excess of one million. For the purpose of such reimbursement of expenses, the city of New York shall be deemed to be one county;

(b) when any judge of the county court, the surrogate's court, the family court, the district court, the civil court of the city of New York or the criminal court of the city of New York shall be required to perform judicial duties outside the county of his residence, he shall be reimbursed for his actual and necessary transportation expenses, and such other travel expenses not to exceed seventy-five dollars per day incurred other than in a county having a population in excess of seven hundred thousand or in a city having a population in excess of one million, and not to exceed one hundred dollars per day in a county having a population in excess of seven hundred thousand or in a city having a population in excess of one million. For the purpose of such reimbursement of expenses, the city of New York shall be deemed to be one county.

§ 12. Section two hundred twenty-three of such law, as added by chapter fifty-five of the laws of nineteen hundred seventy-nine, is amended to read as follows:

§ 223. Compensation of deputy chief administrators of the courts and deputy or assistant administrative judges. (a) A judge who is designated the deputy chief administrator of the courts for the city of New York, and a judge who is designated the deputy chief administrator of the courts outside the city of New York shall each receive an annual salary equal to the annual salary paid to an associate justice of the appellate division of the supreme court.

(b) A judge who is designated a deputy or assistant administrative judge within the city of New York and a judge who is designated an administrative judge for a judicial district or county outside the city of New York shall receive, in addition to his judicial salary, the sum of two thousand dollars annually as compensation for his services as an administrative judge.

§ 13. Such law is amended by adding a new section two hundred twenty-four to read as follows:

§ 224. Compensation of judges on temporary assignment. Every state-paid judge or justice of the unified court system who is assigned from the court to which he was elected or appointed to another court or who is assigned to perform judicial duties at a location outside the county of his residence or, in the case of a judge or justice residing in the city of New York, outside such city, shall, during the time of such assignment, receive either the compensation to which he is entitled in the court to which he was elected or appointed, or the compensation received by a judge or justice in the court or location to which he is assigned, whichever is higher.

§ 14. Subdivision (f) of section one hundred ten of the New York city civil court act, as amended by chapter three hundred ten of the laws of nineteen hundred seventy-eight, is amended to read as follows:

(f) The housing judges shall be appointed by the administrative judge from a list of persons selected annually as qualified by training, interest, experience, judicial temperament and knowledge of federal, state and local housing laws and programs by the advisory council for the housing part. The annual salary of a housing judge shall be sixty-six thousand two hundred fifty dollars.

§ 15. The salary payable to any judge or justice of the unified court system for judicial service during a period commencing prior to January

first, nineteen hundred eighty-five shall be determined in accordance with the applicable provision of law with respect to judicial salaries in effect for such period.

§ 16. In the event that the salary to be paid to any judge or justice of the unified court system set forth in section two hundred twenty-one-1 of the judiciary law, as added by section ten of this act, is lower than the salary being paid to any such judge or justice immediately prior to the effective date of this act, such judge or justice shall receive such higher salary until the expiration of the term of office of such judge or justice. Upon the commencement of the next succeeding term of office, such salary shall be the amount set forth in such section.

§ 17. Section seven hundred of the county law is amended by adding a new subdivision eleven to read as follows:

11. (a) In addition to the state aid provided in subdivision ten hereof, each county, the salary of the district attorney of which is determined pursuant to section one hundred eighty-three-a of the judiciary law, shall be entitled to receive state aid in an amount equal to the difference between: (i) the salary required to be paid to the district attorney of such county pursuant to such section one hundred eighty-three-a on January first, nineteen hundred eighty-five, not including any additional compensation which may have been provided by local law pursuant to such section one hundred eighty-three-a, and (ii) the salary required to be paid to such district attorney pursuant to such section one hundred eighty-three-a immediately prior to such date, or the salary actually paid, if higher.

(b) Commencing with the nineteen hundred eighty-five calendar year, the comptroller shall annually determine the amount of state aid payable to each county pursuant to paragraph (a) hereof for each calendar year and shall pay such amount on his audit and warrant to the chief fiscal officer of each such county during the month of September in each such year.

§ 18. Section five of the legislative law is repealed and a new section five is added to read as follows:

§ 5. Compensation of members. Each member of the legislature shall receive a salary of forty-three thousand dollars per annum. The salary of a member of the legislature shall be payable in twenty-six bi-weekly installments.

§ 19. Section five-a of such law is repealed and a new section five-a is added to read as follows:

§ 5-a. Allowances for member serving as an officer of either house of the legislature or in a special capacity therein. 1. Any member of either house of the legislature serving as an officer of his house or in any other special capacity therein or directly connected therewith shall be paid an allowance in accordance with the following schedule:

§ 20. Subdivision three of section five-a of such law, as added by bill section nineteen of this act, is repealed effective January first, nineteen hundred eighty-seven.

§ 21. Section one hundred sixty-nine of the executive law is repealed and a new section one hundred sixty-nine is added to read as follows:

§ 169. Salaries of certain state officers. 1. Salaries of certain state officers holding the positions indicated hereinafter shall be as set forth in subdivision two of this section:

(a) commissioner of correctional services, commissioner of education, commissioner of health, commissioner of mental health, commissioner of mental retardation and developmental disabilities, chancellor of the state university of New York, and commissioner of transportation;

(b) commissioner of environmental conservation, commissioner of labor, commissioner of general services, chairman of public service commission, commissioner of social services, superintendent of state police, commissioner of taxation and finance, director of the division for youth;

(c) commissioner of agriculture and markets, director of division of alcoholism and alcohol abuse, superintendent of banks, chief of staff to the governor, commissioner and president of state civil service commission, commissioner of commerce, commissioner of criminal justice services, commissioner of the state energy office and chairman of the energy research and development authority, executive director of division of equalization and assessment, president of higher education services corporation, superintendent of insurance, commissioner of motor vehicles, commissioner of parks, recreation and historic preservation, member-chairman of board of parole, director of probation, chairman of public employment relations board, secretary of state, chairman of the state racing and wagering board, director of division of substance abuse services, executive director of the housing finance agency, commissioner of housing and community renewal, executive director of state insurance fund, commissioner-chairman of state liquor authority, chairman of the workers' compensation board;

(d) director of office for the aging, member-chairman of commission on cable television, commissioner of human rights, executive director of the state board of elections, commissioners of the department of public service, chairman of state commission on quality of care for the mentally disabled, chairman of commission on alcoholism and substance abuse prevention and education, executive director of the council on the arts and executive director of the board of social welfare;

(e) chairman of state athletic commission, chairman and executive director of consumer protection board, member-chairman of crime victims board, chairman of human rights appeal board, chairman of the industrial board of appeals, chairman of the labor relations board, chairman of commission on public employee pension and retirement systems, members of tax commission, chairman of the state commission of correction, chairman of the state mediation board, members of the state commission on quality of care for the mentally disabled, members of the board of parole, members of the state racing and wagering board, member-chairman of unemployment insurance appeal board, director of veterans' affairs, and vice-chairman of the workers' compensation board;

(f) executive director of adirondack park agency, commissioners of the state liquor authority, commissioners of the state civil service commission, members of state commission of correction, members of the labor relations board, members of crime victims board, members of the state

mediation board, members of unemployment insurance appeal board, and members of the workers' compensation board.

2. (a) Effective July first, nineteen hundred eighty-four, the annual salaries of the officers holding the positions indicated in subdivision one of this section shall be as follows: for the positions listed in paragraph (a), \$78,400; in paragraph (b), \$73,400; in paragraph (c), \$69,600; in paragraph (d), \$63,400; in paragraph (e), \$58,600; and in paragraph (f), \$52,500.

(b) Effective January first, nineteen hundred eighty-five, the annual salaries of the officers holding the positions indicated in subdivision one of this section shall be as follows: for the positions listed in paragraph (a), \$81,200; in paragraph (b), \$75,900; in paragraph (c), \$72,100; in paragraph (d), \$65,600; in paragraph (e), \$60,700; and in paragraph (f), \$54,300.

(c) Notwithstanding any of the foregoing provisions of this subdivision or any other law, the basic annual salaries of officers holding positions set forth in subdivision one of this section shall be increased by an amount or percentage which is equal to the amount or percentage of increase to basic annual salaries received by officers and employees whose positions are designated managerial or confidential pursuant to article fourteen of the civil service law during the fiscal years commencing April first, nineteen hundred eighty-five and nineteen hundred eighty-six.

(d) Notwithstanding any of the foregoing provisions of this subdivision or any other law to the contrary, effective on the date or dates on which the basic annual salaries of officers holding positions in subdivision one of this section are increased as provided in paragraph (c) of this subdivision, the salary schedule set forth in paragraph (b) of this subdivision shall be superseded by a new salary schedule, promulgated by the director of the budget, which shall reflect the increase in basic annual salary authorized for and received by such officers pursuant to paragraph (c) of this subdivision. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this section, such salary increases provided by paragraph (c) of this subdivision may be withheld in whole or in part on an equal basis from the officers and employees holding positions set forth in subdivision one of this section when, in the opinion of the director of the budget, such adjustments are warranted or are appropriate.

(e) Notwithstanding any of the foregoing provisions of this section to the contrary, an incumbent in a position (i) listed in former section one hundred sixty-nine of the executive law in effect on the day prior to the effective date of this section, or (ii) listed in this section, or (iii) covered by a provision of law other than such sections, shall not receive compensation in an amount less than such person received on the effective date of this section.

§ 22. Section eight hundred three of such law, as amended by chapter four hundred sixty-four of the laws of nineteen hundred seventy-five, is amended to read as follows:

§ 803. Adirondack park agency. There is hereby created in the executive department, the Adirondack park agency, which shall consist of the following members: the commissioner of environmental conservation, the secretary of state, the commissioner of commerce and eight members to be appointed by the governor by and with the advice and consent of the senate. The governor shall designate a chairman from among the members appointed to the agency, who shall serve at the governor's pleasure. None of the members appointed by the governor shall be officers or employees of any state department or agency.

Five members appointed by the governor shall be full-time residents within the Adirondack park provided, however, that no two such members shall be residents of the same county except for such members initially appointed before January first, nineteen hundred seventy-three, who may be reappointed for additional successive terms. Three members appointed by the governor shall be residents of the state outside the Adirondack park. Not more than five appointed members shall be of the same political party.

All appointments shall be made for terms of four years; provided that the first member appointed by the governor pursuant to the increase of members from seven to eight shall be appointed for a term expiring on the thirtieth day of June, nineteen hundred seventy-six. Each of such appointed members of the agency shall hold office for the term for which

he was appointed and until his successor shall have been appointed and qualified or until he shall resign or be removed in the manner provided by law. In the case of any vacancy other than one arising by expiration of term, an appointment to fill the vacancy shall be made for the remainder of the unexpired term.

The designated chairman shall receive an annual salary of thirty thousand dollars. The other members of the agency, except those who serve ex officio, shall receive one hundred dollars per diem, not to exceed five thousand dollars per annum compensation for their services as members of the agency[, and each of them,]. All members, except those who serve ex officio, shall be allowed the necessary and actual expenses [which he shall incur] incurred in the performance of [his] duties under this article.

A majority of the members of the agency shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of any business or the exercise of any power or function of the agency and affirmative vote by a majority of the members of the agency, except as is otherwise specifically provided in this article, shall be required to exercise any power or function of the agency. Votes of any member shall be cast in person and not by proxy. The agency may delegate to one or more of its members, officers, agents and employees, such powers and duties as it deems proper.

The commissioner of environmental conservation and the commissioner of commerce and the secretary of state may, by official authority filed in their respective agencies, and with the Adirondack park agency, designate a deputy or other officer to exercise his powers and perform his duties, including the right to vote, on the agency.

§ 23. Subdivision five of section one hundred nine of the state finance law, as amended by chapter one thousand twenty-eight of the laws of nineteen hundred eighty-one, is amended to read as follows:

5. Notwithstanding the provisions of this or any other law, those officers and employees of the state, other than those specified in subdivision six of this section, who hold positions in the executive branch for which there is in force on December thirty-first, nineteen hundred eighty an appropriation which specifies an amount for a payment in lieu of expenses, shall on and after January first, nineteen hundred eighty-one not be eligible to receive such payment and shall instead receive, and officers holding positions indicated in section one hundred sixty-nine of the executive law shall receive, effective January first, nineteen hundred [eighty-one] *eighty-five*, a per diem allowance when in travel status, in accordance with rules and regulations of the comptroller, of [fifty-five] *seventy-five* dollars and shall receive reimbursement for actual and necessary transportation expenses when in travel status in accordance with rules and regulations of the comptroller.

§ 24. Notwithstanding the provisions of any other law to the contrary, those persons for whom a fixed per diem allowance is established in law shall receive on and after January first, nineteen hundred eighty-five, a per diem allowance of one hundred dollars when in travel status in the state in a county having a population in excess of seven hundred thousand or in a city having a population in excess of one million.

§ 25. Use of appropriations. The comptroller is authorized to pay any amounts required during the fiscal year commencing April first, nineteen hundred eighty-four by the foregoing provisions of this act for any state department or agency from any appropriation or other funds available to such state department or agency for personal service or for other related employee benefits during such fiscal year. Such amounts shall be treated as a liability for the fiscal year commencing April first, nineteen hundred eighty-four to be payable from funds appropriated for such year. To the extent that such appropriations are insufficient to accomplish the purposes herein set forth, the director of the budget is authorized to allocate to the various departments and agencies, from any appropriations available for the fiscal year commencing April first, nineteen hundred eighty-four the amounts necessary to pay such amounts.

§ 26. Payments from special or administrative funds. If the compensation to which officers and employees of the state are otherwise entitled is payable from a special or administrative fund or funds, other than the state purposes account, the local assistance account, or the capital projects fund of the general fund of the state, the increase in compensation to which such officers or employees are entitled under this act shall be payable from such other fund or funds in the same manner as such other compensation. If the amounts appropriated or allocable from

such other fund or funds are insufficient to accomplish the purposes of this act, the director of the budget is hereby authorized to allocate such additional sums from such other fund or funds as may be necessary therefor; provided, however, that no transfer shall be made between two or more of such funds.

§ 27. Effect of participation in special annuity program. No officer or employee participating in a special annuity program pursuant to the provisions of article eight-C of the education law shall, by reason of an increase in compensation pursuant to this act, suffer any reduction of the salary adjustment to which he would otherwise be entitled by reason of participation in such program, and such salary adjustment shall be based upon the salary of such officer or employee without regard to the reduction authorized by said article.

§ 28. Date of entitlement to salary increase. Notwithstanding the provisions of this act or of any other law, the increase of salary or compensation of any officer or employee provided by this act shall be added to the salary or compensation of such officer or employee at the beginning of that payroll period the first day of which is nearest to the effective date of such increase as provided in this act, or at the beginning of the earlier of two payroll periods the first day of which are nearest but equally near to the effective date of such increase as provided in this act; provided, however, that for the purposes of determining the salary of such officer or employee upon reclassification, reallocation, appointment, promotion, transfer, demotion, reinstatement or other change of status, such salary increase shall be deemed to be effective on the date thereof as prescribed in this act, and the payment thereof pursuant to this section on a date prior thereto, instead of on such effective date, shall not operate to confer any additional salary rights or benefits on such officer or employee.

§ 29. Deferred payment of salary increase. Notwithstanding the provisions of this act or of any other law, commencing July first, nineteen hundred eighty-four, and pending payment pursuant to this act of the basic annual salaries of incumbents of positions subject to this act commencing July first, nineteen hundred eighty-four, such incumbents shall receive, as partial compensation for services rendered, the rate of compensation otherwise payable in their respective positions on July first, nineteen hundred eighty-four. An incumbent holding a position subject to this act at any time during the period from July first, nineteen hundred eighty-four, until the time when basic annual salaries are first paid pursuant to this act for such service in excess of the compensation actually received therefor shall be entitled to a lump sum payment for the difference between the salary to which such incumbent is entitled for such service and the compensation actually received therefor. Such lump sum payment shall be made as soon as practicable.

§ 30. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section or part of this act shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction, to be invalid or unconstitutional, such judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, section or part thereof directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment shall have been rendered.

§ 31. The provisions of this act shall be controlling notwithstanding any general, special or local law to the contrary.

§ 32. This act shall take effect immediately, provided however that:
(a) sections one through twenty of this act shall take effect January first, nineteen hundred eighty-five; and
(b) sections twenty-one through twenty-nine of this act shall be retroactive to and deemed to be in full force and effect from and after July first, nineteen hundred eighty-four provided, further however, that the provisions of this act providing for retroactive salary increases shall be effective from and after the date or dates specified in this act for such increases.

1. Subject and Purpose: This bill is intended to provide salary increases and certain other allowances for judges and justices of the unified court system, members of the Legislature, housing justices, and certain executive officers and employees of the State.
2. Summary of Provisions: Effective immediately this measure would:
 - a. Repeal and establish various new provisions of the Judiciary Law to provide increased salaries, additional compensation and travel expenses for certain judges and justices of the unified court system;
 - b. Amend the county law to provide reimbursement to counties for additional expenses incurred as a result of required district attorney salary increases resulting from certain State mandates;
 - c. Increase the salaries of members of the Legislature from \$32,960 to \$43,000 and establish a revised schedule of allowances to be paid to a member of either house of the Legislature who serves as an officer or in a special capacity;
 - d. Provide salary increases effective July 1, 1984, January 1, 1985, and April 1, 1985 and 1986 to officers and employees covered by the provisions of section 169 of the Executive Law;
 - e. Revise the assignment of certain positions to paragraphs of section 169 of such law;
 - f. Establish the compensation of the Chairman of the Adirondack Park Agency at \$30,000 annually; and,
 - g. Increase the per diem travel allowance of certain employees from \$55 to \$75 and in certain locations, from \$75 to \$100.
3. Legislative History: Salaries were last increased for the affected positions by Chapter 881 of the Laws of 1980.
4. Arguments in Support: This measure would ameliorate some of the salary compression problems being experienced in the executive and judicial branches in New York State. Moreover, this bill would provide for salary and allowance increases necessary to partially offset inflation experienced since such salaries were last raised.
5. Possible Objections: None known.

6. Other State Agencies Interested: The Office of Employee Relations and the Office of Court Administration would be interested in this measure.
7. Known Position of Others: None known.
8. Budget Implications: Implementation of the provisions of this measure would cost approximately \$18.5 million annually. It is expected that costs to be incurred during FY 1984-85 will be absorbed within existing agency appropriations.
9. Recommendations: This bill will help ameliorate the executive and judicial salary compression problems experienced within New York State over the last several years. Further, this measure would provide salary and allowance improvements for members of the Legislature, certain judges and justices, and certain officers and employees of the State. Such increases are essential in order to maintain internal salary relationships among agency heads and between such executives and unionized employees and to keep pace with the inflation of the previous two years when these officers, members, justices and employees received no general salary increase. We therefore recommend approval of this bill.
