I have received no response to my below e-mail – and have, in the meantime, found the "measure" to which your May 1st article refers.

It is <u>Part WW</u> of Governor Cuomo's misnomered "Article VII" bill on "Public Protection and General Government", which was the SOLE new Part that he added to that bill, when he introduced his "30-day amendments". He furnished no memorandum in support of the new Part. Six weeks later – at the height of the coronavirus crisis -- when the bill emerged from the behind-closed-doors deal-making of the "three-men-in-a-room", it had been "amended", again -- with Part WW retained, unchanged. For you convenience here are pdfs for the 3 iterations of the Governor's so-called "Article VII" bill on "Public Protection and General Government" and their dates of introduction: <u>S.7505/A.9505</u> (Jan. 22, 2020); <u>S.7505-A/A.9505-A</u> (February 22, 2020); <u>S.7505-B/A.9505-B</u> (March 31, 2020). Here, additionally, are the <u>Senate webpage</u> and the <u>Assembly webpage</u> for the bill, as well as the Governor's <u>Division of the Budget webpage foe</u> the "30-day amendments"
