The duty of the Montgomery County D.A. is to enforce New York's penal laws and obey conflict of interest protocols. That is the subject of the Center for Judicial Accountability's above-attached and here-linked July 18, 2024 grand jury/public corruption complaint to Montgomery County D.A. Lorraine Diamond. It involves her \$221,100 D.A. salary, statutorily-tied to the Montgomery county court judge salary. Of this, \$101,300 is the product of three "false instrument", penal law-violating commission reports that Montgomery County's three state legislators, two running for re-election, are knowledgeable of and complicit in.

D.A. Diamond is running, <u>uncontested</u>, to be Montgomery county court judge – and her top assistant, Christina Pearson, is running, <u>uncontested</u>, to replace her as Montgomery County D.A. By the below July 24, 2024 e-mail, I forwarded to Candidate Pearson the July 18, 2024 grand jury/public corruption complaint, requesting her response by August 1st to two simple questions:

- (1) whether, if elected, she would repudiate the \$101,300 salary difference and advise Montgomery County to secure a judicial declaration voiding the three "false instrument", penal law-violating commission reports?;
- (2) whether, if elected, she would recuse herself from the July 18, 2024 grand jury/public corruption complaint and secure an independent prosecutor?

D.A. Candidate Pearson did not respond. Surely, she will be more responsive to inquiries from you – and I am cc'ing her on this e-mail so that she can be fully prepared.

What does she have to say about the \$221,100 Montgomery County D.A. salary – and about Montgomery County's state legislators whose public corruption is <u>prioritized</u> by the July 18, 2024 grand jury/public corruption complaint (at pp. 2-4). Will she disclose her political, professional, and personal relationships

with them – and with the other public officers complained-against and implicated by the grand jury/public corruption complaint?

And can D.A. Candidate Pearson explain how it is possible that notwithstanding Montgomery County has a population of 49,624 and median household income of \$58,033 and state legislator salaries are the highest in the nation, \$142,000, on top of which, as with D.A. salaries, are many thousands of dollars more in non-salary compensation benefits:

- <u>Assemblyman Robert Smullen (AD118)</u> is <u>uncontested</u> for re-election and is running on <u>both</u> Republican and Conservative lines for which he faced <u>no</u> primaries for either line;
- <u>Assemblyman Angelo Santabarbara (AD111)</u> is running for re-election on the Democratic line, for which he faced <u>no</u> primaries for that line, against <u>Joseph Mastroianni</u>, running on both Republican and Conservative lines for which he faced no primaries for either line;
- Assemblywoman Patricia Fahy is running for election on <u>both</u> Democratic and Working Families lines for the seat held by <u>retiring Senator Neil Breslin (SD46)</u>, for which she faced <u>no</u> primaries for either line, and <u>Theodore Danz, Jr.</u> is running on <u>both</u> Republican and Conservative lines for which he faced <u>no</u> primaries for either line.

Indeed, can D.A. Candidate Pearson explain how it is possible that she is <u>uncontested</u> for election on <u>both</u> Republican and Conservative lines for which she faced <u>no</u> primaries for either line – and, even more incredibly, how it is possible that her boss, D.A. Diamond, is running <u>uncontested</u> for Montgomery county court judge on Republican, Conservative, and Democratic lines for which she faced <u>no</u> primaries?

I look forward to discussing with you the above questions and assisting your <u>investigative journalism</u> about Montgomery County's D.A. race, three state legislative races, and judicial races from supreme court to city court – all involving "false instrument", penal law-violating salaries for these offices. Meantime, here's CJA's webpage for the 2024 Montgomery County D.A. election.

I am director and co-founder of the non-partisan, non-profit citizens' organization Center for Judicial Accountability, Inc. (CJA), which, for several decades, has documented the collusion of all three branches of our state government in the subversion and collapse of lawful, constitutional governance. New York's 62 D.A.s, whose duty it is to enforce the state's penal laws, including against law-breaking public officers, are key participants in this.

Of this year's 14 D.A. races, nine are uncontested. You are two of the nine D.A. candidates running unopposed and presumptive "winners" in the "elections" unless the voters rebel by launching write-in campaigns to elect persons more suited for so important an office.

I have already written to the other seven unopposed D.A. candidates, <u>five incumbent D.A.s</u> and <u>two acting D.A.s</u>, and to New York's 55 other D.A.s and acting D.A.s, sending them the above three attachments by the below July 18th e-mail entitled "NOTICE & grand jury/public corruption complaint – Your D.A. salary increases, the judicial salary increases on which they are based, & the violations of NY penal laws by state legislators within your jurisdictions", requesting their answers, by August 1st, to two simple questions:

- (1) whether they will be repudiating their state-mandated D.A. salary increases, paid from their county budgets, because they are based on three "false instrument", penal law-violating commission reports raising judicial salaries;
- (2) confirmation that they will be recusing themselves from CJA's July 18, 2024 grand jury/public corruption complaint pertaining thereto and securing an independent prosecutor.

In the event <u>your non-re-election-seeking D.A.</u> bosses to whom you are each top assistants, Montgomery County D.A. Diamond and Orleans County D.A. Cardone, did not share with you my above correspondence, you now have it by this e-mail.

If elected, what would your answers be? Please let me hear from you by August 1st so that, based on your answers, Montgomery and Orleans county voters may be apprised as to whether write-in campaigns must be launched for suitable D.A. candidates who will abide by their duty to enforce the penal laws, including by recusing themselves when compromised by self-interest and relationships.

I am available to answer questions and assist you in demonstrating your fitness for the office to which you aspire.
